Carleton High INI School Awarded Most Improved School in North of England

Carleton High School, a secondary school within our Trust, has been hailed as the most improved school in the North of England, according to the Fairer Secondary Schools Index league tables, published by the Northern Powerhouse Partnership

The index ranks schools on a contextual progress score that takes pupils' backgrounds into account. Even prior to this award, Carleton High School has been making history with their phenonmenal progress having moved from special measures to Ofsted good in just twelve months, which in the education sector is very rare.

Chief Executive Officer of Pontefract Academies Trust, Julian Appleyard OBE said: "This is incredibly pleasing and is exactly what we set out to achieve. Carleton High School is going from strength to strength and is one of the most improved schools in the country for progress 8. To achieve most improved school in the North of England is just the icing on the cake and is testament to the hard work, dedication and persistence of our students, parents and staff.'

Pontefract Academies Trust Invests £90,000 into Outdoor

Learning and Play



Pontefract Academies Trust is delighted to announce that they have invested around £90,000 into outdoor learning facilities for Halfpenny Lane and The Rookeries Carleton Junior, Infant & Nursery School.

Children and staff are now able to take advantage of state of the art playground equipment which includes planting areas, den making apparatus and textured multi coloured flooring to help heighten the senses and encourage creative play. The brand new areas also have an outdoor stage for performances, waterplay equipment designed to help strenghthen problem solving skills as well as bird and ladybird boxes to study their local natural surroundings and wildlife. The areas at both schools have been created to help the children explore and discover as well as ignite their imagination and creativity.

The project has been designed primarily for early years ages 3,4 and 5 by award winning educational playground specialist ESP Play but will be of benefit to the entire school community for years to come.

Andrew Wood, Managing Director of ESP Play said: "We're incredibly proud to work with Pontefract Academies Trust and delighted with the end result. As a business we've worked with schools across the UK and are firm believers that our equipment helps to make young people more physically active, confident, healthy and determined to achieve."

Our Creative Children produced 200 Poppies for **Remembrance Day**

All 6 of our primary schools made around 200 poppies to be displayed opposite Valley Gardens in Pontefract Town Centre for all to come and see and mark Remembrance Day on the 11th November

The idea behind this was to help all the children to learn the meaning behind Remembrance Sunday, Armistice Day, and the significance of the ceremonies and the poppy symbol in a creative and thought provoking way. Pontefract Academies Trust are working in partnership with Pontefract Civic Society who have created the display which was available for all to see from the 5th until 18th November

The schools that took part are Halfpenny Lane Junior, Infant and Nursery School; Orchard Head Junior, Infant and Nursery School; De Lacy Primary School; Carleton Park Junior and Infant School; Larks Hill Junior and Infant School; The Rookeries Junior, Infant and Nursery School, who are all part of Pontefract Academies Trust.
