Links to future learning Character/Wider Development ('50 things', cultural capital, skills)	 Knowledge:- Year 7 – coverage of World religions, knowledge of basics of Christianity: the Bible, the Holy Trinity, Jesus as son of God. Year 8 – Global issues including charities. Skill development:- a) Pupils will study parables told by Jesus in the Bible and as a result learn to explain the origins of core Christian values, rather than just being able to list them or having just a basic knowledge of them. b) Evaluation. Written and verbal responses to questions using: Yes and reasons why or No and reasons why with concluding paragraphs. Educational visit to local churches (if impossible, due to restrictions, consider virtual tour), have children look for signs of Jesus in and around the building. Fund-raising project related to lesson on charity and generosity. Children could design a method of fund raising and decide which charity to donate the money to.
